
Bizarre Body Parts



Seahorse - Hippocampus

When Ancient Greeks looked inside the human skull, they noticed part of the brain appeared to have a head, body, and curled tail, just like a seahorse. Now we know that the hippocampus binds together sights, sounds, tastes, smells, thoughts, and emotions into a memory.





Little Grape - Uvula

The little dangly lump hanging from the back of your throat is called *little grape* in Latin. The uvula helps seal off your nasal cavity from your throat cavity when you swallow.





Little Plate - Kneecap

In Ancient Rome a *patella* was a small dish or saucer, and its name was also given to the small movable bone commonly called the kneecap.





Little Air Holder - Artery








Little Moon - Lunula

The Latin word for moon is *luna*, (also the name of the Roman moon goddess). From that we get *lunula*, which is the name of the living part of the fingernail and toenail, a visible white, half-moon-shape at the nail's base.





Cuckoo's Beak - Tailbone

The scientific name for your tailbone is the coccyx, from the Greek word for cuckoo: *kokkux*. The Ancients thought the curved shape of the bone resembles the bird's beak.
